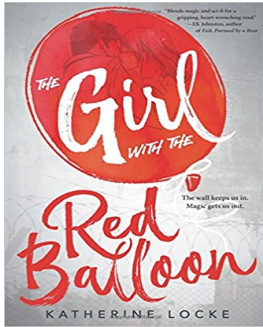


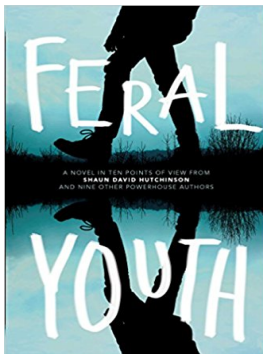

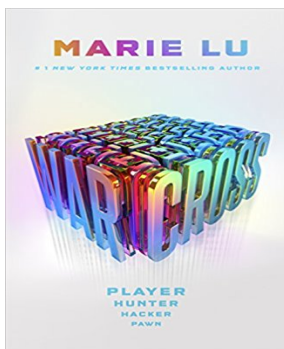
The Girl with The Red Balloon by Katharine Locke

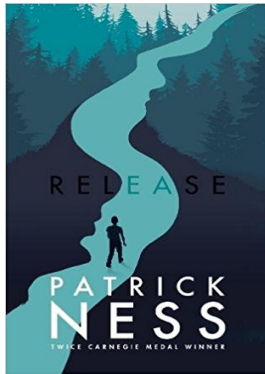
Feral Youth by Shaun David Hutchinson

At Zeppelin Bend, an outdoor-education program designed to teach troubled youth the value of hard work, cooperation, and compassion, ten teens are left alone in the wild. The teens are a diverse group who come all walks of life, and were all sent to Zeppelin Bend as a last chance to get them to turn their lives around. They've just spent nearly two weeks hiking, working, learning to survive in the wilderness, and now their instructors have dropped them off eighteen miles from camp with no food, no water, and only their packs, and they'll have to struggle to overcome their vast differences if they hope to survive.



War Cross by Marie Lu (Book 1)

For the millions who log in every day, Warcross isn't just a game—it's a way of life. The obsession started ten years ago and its fan base now spans the globe, some eager to escape from reality and others hoping to make a profit. 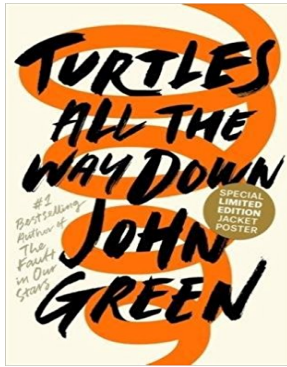
Speak Easy, Speak Love by McKelle George

Renegades by Marissa Meyer (Book 1 of Series)

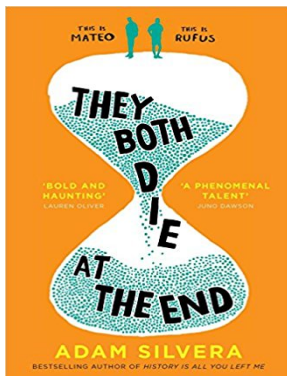

Turtles All The Way Down by John Green

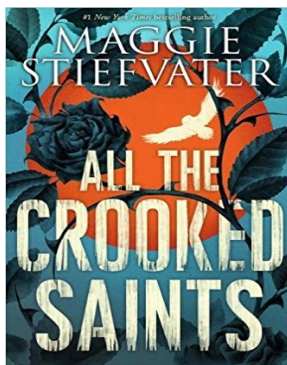

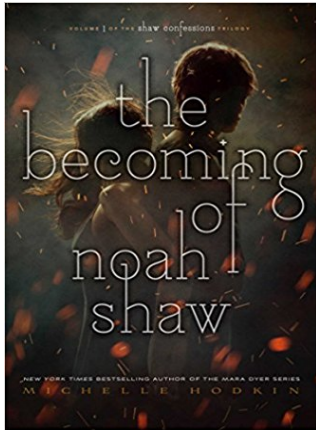
The Both Die at the End by Adam Silvera

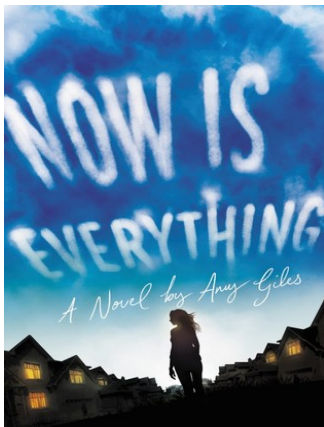
All the Crooked Saints by Maggie Stiefvater

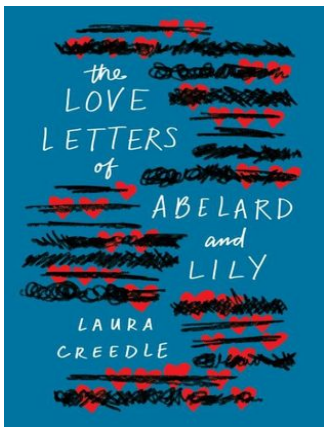
The Becoming of Noah Shaw by Michelle Hodkin (Book 1 of *The Shaw Confessions*)

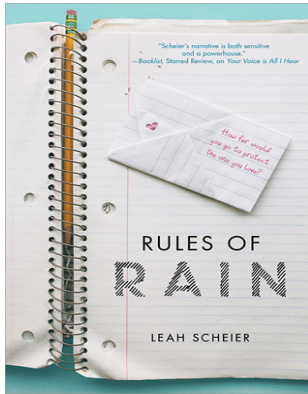
Now is Everything by Amy Giles

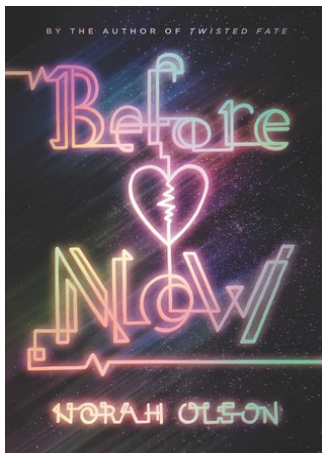
The Love Letters of Abelard and Lily by Laura Creedle

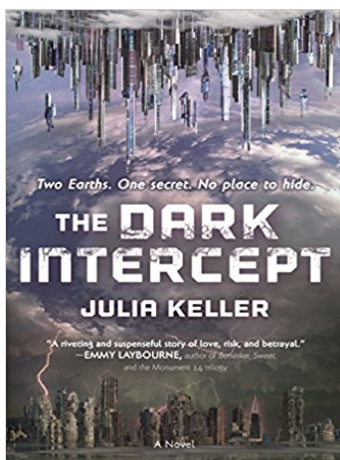
The Rules of Rain by Leah Scheier
