Dear Parents, Old Columbans and Friends of the College,

Every school needs to keep developing its facilities in the short term, while also having the vision to look to the future and to schemes that will enhance the school community for generations to come.

As we have been mulling over the future direction of the College, we are all in agreement that what is most important is the current and future sustainability of the College and the fact that we need to make decisions now that will affect the College for years to come. I know very well how strongly the pupils in the College feel about this issue, so we have decided that the focus on sustainability should be paramount in our planning and that development of new teaching facilities will spring from the changes that will be made as we go along that path.

At the same time, we feel the need to ensure that the College is accessible to a wider range of families, by providing transformative bursaries, enabling far more young people to attend the College whose parents may not be in a financial position to afford our fees.

All our aims are interlinked and they have been distilled into four pillars:

- Sustainability: the desire to transform our energy usage and make the College far more environmentally focused.
- Bursaries: these will broaden access to the College for families who cannot currently afford to send their children here.
- Classrooms: there is a need for some new classroom development and this will be able to take place as a direct result of our mission to become more sustainable and the subsequent reattribution of space in the middle of the College.
- Campus enhancement: we need to enhance the entrance and the approach to the College, as well as upgrade certain areas within the campus.

Within this literature there are details of multiple ways for you to get involved and support the College. Whether it is to support our Sustainability projects or Bursaries, I trust that the next generation of Columbans and their parents will be able to look back at the decisions that we are making now and will be grateful that, in this generation, we had the vision to look ahead and to put the College onto a much more sustainable footing.

A SUSTAINABLE COLLEGE

Net-Zero Emissions

With wildfires sweeping across western Europe in the summer of 2023, global warming can no longer be ignored. We do know two things for certain: climate change is being caused by humans, but we can do something about it.

St. Columba's College recognises its privileged position in a developed country, and that's why we are on a mission to eliminate fossil fuel use by 2030.

On our journey to having a more sustainable campus the work being undertaken under the Foundation's Sustainability Pillar, which was launched in September 2022, has already completed its first major project. This initial project was the installation of Solar PV panels on the Sports Hall roof.

The system size is 280KW Peak using 680 panels. It will generate circa 200,000 units (KWH's) of electricity per annum with an estimated payback of 4 years. It is estimated that by covering the full roof, we will supply 35 to 40% of our 'annual' daily usage with excess electricity sold back to our provider at market rates.

Energy Service Contract (ESC).

The College has been awarded funding by the SEAI, under the Energy Contracting Grant Scheme, to assist with the costs of external consultancy and materials with the aim of getting three Energy Service Companies to compete for the contract to Design, Build, Operate and Maintain a heating and hot water system with turnkey responsibility for multiple measures to decarbonise the campus and deliver year on year energy savings.

The likely measures may include a new Distributed Heat System, a Woodchip Biomass Boiler and building an Energy Management System (EMS).

The first stage is a preliminary technical analysis involving the installation of thermal submetering to ascertain better energy usage around the campus. The next step is the invitation to Participate in Competitive Dialogue with the Energy Service Companies.

The College outlines its requirements and the ESCO's consider the proposal and are likely to carry out their own energy audit of the campus. After this process the companies will be invited to Submit Final Tender and after preparing the final procurement, technical and contract documents the Energy Service Company is appointed.

The project will require significant capital outlay and the more capital that we can raise the better chance the College has of attracting more interest from potential ESC's.

Impassioned pupils have been writing letters to the Warden requesting increased action on sustainability. We have listened and we are taking action.

The Fellows, management and pupils are all very engaged in the vision and it is vital that we represent their needs and the needs of our planet. With regards to cost-savings, energy inflation means it is imperative that we seek out renewable technologies that will keep our operating costs stable. Last year our energy-related costs were €294,000 inc. VAT. This year, we will avail of Government grants where we can, but anticipate that the above projects may involve an investment of up to €2,000,000. The benefits and the business case for moving in this direction stack up: lasting energy cost savings, security of supply against rising energy costs and decarbonisation of our energy needs.

We firmly believe that Columbans in 10 years' time will look back and know that the College was on the right side of history.

Transformational Bursaries

Our essential bursary funds offer world-class access:

The Endowment Fund:

In order to sustain our long-term commitment to providing bursaries and other financial support to current and prospective pupils with the aim of widening access to a St. Columba's College education the College is launching an Endowment Fund with a planned launch date of Summer 2023.

To fulfil its objective the Fund will require donations, legacies and other contributions. The Fund launch is an ambitious project that will involve a multi-year build up phase in order to deliver the vision of providing transformational education for many pupils in the future. By giving to the Endowment Fund, donors will be helping to build a resource that will be maintained over the long term in order to ensure that the benefits of their gifts are enjoyed by many future generations of pupils.

The Old Columban Society Bursary Fund:

This fund was established in 2011 to support children and grandchildren of Old Columbans. For various reasons, some Old Columban families have been unable to meet the full cost of the College fees.

The purpose of the fund is to offer financial assistance to these individuals. Monies donated to this fund go directly to support OC families in paying their fees.

Facilities

We are fortunate to have enviable facilities at the College, but it is necessary to continue to invest in our core business, which is teaching and learning.

As we look to put the College onto a more sustainable footing for the future, we will be able to free up an ideal space in the middle of the College for an exciting new classroom development which will have a focus on sustainable entrepreneurship and business.

Having transformed the centre of the College with the wonderful creation of Whispering House in the Warden's Garden, it is time to turn our attention to transforming the lower yard.

I believe that it is possible to create an iconic space down there, where the boiler house currently is and where the old pottery shed sits which will enhance the teaching and learning experience of all Columban pupils, while maintaining the core vision of making the College more sustainable.

We do not yet have plans for that development, as it will grow organically from the space created by the building of the Energy Centre elsewhere in the College and once the boiler house has been repurposed.

OUR PLANS:

Defining the Gateway

Refreshed entrance and signage along the drive to incorporate a pair of pillars to create a superior first impression of the College. To include structural planting and hedges and splashes of colour.



The Steward's House Garden (previously Pullmans' House)

Pillars and beech arch to match the traditions of the College and to give access and a focal point to a memorial garden area. Theatre lawn/outdoor performance space for plays, films, shows or outdoor classes connected with a biodiversity area. This would be developed with a backdrop and wings created by yew and hornbeam hedging.



Welcome/Meeting Area

We would like to create a welcome area at the place where parents drop off and collect their children at the Sports Hall roundabout. We propose creating a seating area with matching planting and beds to frame the gym.




Planting Scheme

We plan to unify the College's campus with an updated planting scheme with better structural form, hedging and colourful shrubs, especially outside Kennedy building. All of these will mirror the planting of the Steward's Garden, welcome area and entrance. At some later time, the rose garden between the Beech arch and the Doll's House could be planted with a similar planting scheme.

Biodiversity

Most importantly, we want to use our beautiful campus as a way to deliver our commitment to sustainability and biodiversity. Let's educate our pupils through practical activities - tree planting, composting, recycling - to be accompanied by explanatory signage explaining why we have a problem and what we hope to do about it.




Biodiversity areas could be between the Theatre Lawn, poly tunnel and the Deer Park. The 6th Form could plant a few trees / whips (2ft tall young tree) before they leave as a lasting legacy of their time at the College and also to improve the environment for future generations.
